

Rock of the Month: CHAICHDONY

A microcrystalline variety of quartz, chalcedony usually occurs as mammillary or botryoidal masses. The color is highly variable, and may be white, blue, red, green, brown, or black. Varieties of chalcedony include jasper, an opaque form; agate, a form with concentric banding of different colors; moss agate, with dark dendrite patterns; chrysoprase, a green variety; and onyx, in which the banding is parallel. Carnelian is red to reddish brown, and sard is light to dark brown. There is a white streak. Chalcedony is a transparent to translucent or opaque mineral, and it has a vitreous to waxy luster.

Formation: This mineral forms in cavities in rocks of different types, especially lavas. A lot of chalcedony develops at relatively low temperatures, as a precipitate from silica-rich solutions. It can also be formed as a dehydration product of opal.

Word of the Month: BASAL CHAVAGE

Cleavage that is parallel to the basal crystal plane of a mineral.

"Homemade Goop' By Connie Wheeler

(Need something to do inside while the winter weather does its stuff with the wet & cold? Here's something fun to make, but you will need an adult to help you! — Editor's Note.)

Kid's will love this stuff. It's similar to the commercial brands of Flubber. The added bonus is while making this stuff, a safe chemical reaction occurs, which is pretty cool to watch.

In one container mix 1-1/2 cups of warm water, 2 cups Elmer's clue, and food coloring.



WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE ?

What's the difference between nodules, geodes and concretions?

A <u>nodule</u> is a rounded mass of irregular shape, a little knob or lump of any kind of mineral. The word 'nodule' comes from the Latin meaning 'knot.'

A geode is a nodule which is hollow or has a cavity that is often lined with one or more minerals. A geode may also be called a hollow nodule. The word 'geode' comes from the Greek meaning 'earth form,' a term from ancient history.

A <u>concretion</u> is a mass formed by the aggregation and precipitation of some mineral like quartz or calcite around a nucleus which may be rounded, spherical, oval, flattened, elongated or a combination of forms. The word comes from the Latin 'to grow together'.

THE BLARNEY STONE

The Blarney Stone is a stone that was built into a wall of an old castle, near the top of it, in the village of Blarney, Ireland, four miles northwest of Cork. HEAT - TREATING BRAZILIAN AGATE

The best material to heat-treat is that which has translucent or transparent areas. The colors obtained are quite pretty. The more opaque slabs produce rather dull colors or gray tones.

Put the slab in a cold oven, set at 200 degrees Farenheit. Move up to 50 degrees every 15 minutes until 550 degrees are reached. Leave it there for 20 minutes. Then turn off the oven and let the slab cool for 24 hours (note: some sources say "a few hours" while others say "24 hours.") Do not work it until the following day as the agate will be quite brittle for 12 to 18 hours. GLNugget, 4/90



How Did the Odd Circle of Rocks at Stonehenge Come To Be?

At Stonehenge in England, stand huge stones, some as high as 24 feet, arranged in three circles, one inside the other. They seem to be in that pattern for a reason, but until only recently, no one knew that reason. People could only guess that it was an ancient temple, which, according to radiocarbon tests, was built in 2200 BC.

Then in 1966, Gerald Hawkins, an astronomy professor, fed the pattern of stones into a computer and found the purpose of Stonehenge. It is not, as many believed, an ancient temple. By checking the rising and setting of the sun at different times of the year through various openings in the circles of stones. Hawkins discovered that Stonehenge was a kind of seasonal calendar by which to calculate the rising and setting of the sun and moon, and even to predict eclipses of the moon.

He found that every June 24th, Mid-summer's Day, a person could stand in the exact center of the circle and know that the rising sun would shine directly on him through a line of stone pillars. As a calendar, this stone structure is amazingly accurate - a tribute to ancient astronomers who lived more than 4,000 years ago!

Professor Gerald Hawkins estimated that it took 1,500,000 man-workdays to construct Stonehenge.

At the AFMS meeting in Jackson, Mississippi, the AFMS recognize the ALAA as their lobbying arm, but this recognition came with no monetary funds being forwarded from the AFMS. At the present time, the ALAA have two bills that have been sent to the Congress of the United States. These are the Fossil Bill and the Rock and Mineral Act. At this time ALAA is trying to get these introduced into the Senate and House of Representatives. I have informed that there will be a mailing from the ALAA President Jon Spongagle to all clubs in the AFMS, with an explanation of the two bills as well as an explanation of the Wewer letter, which was paid for by the ALAA, and is a legal explanation of what clubs can do monetarily and personally toward lobbying. The ALAA and AFMS encourages everyone to write their Representatives in the Senate Chambers and House of Representatives to ask for their support on these bills.

The AFMS Newsletter is the means we have of communicating what is happening in the AFMS to the Regional Federations and the individual clubs, there were 778 clubs within the seven Regional Federations as of Nov. 1, 1997. There were 1863 newsletters printed for the last issue. This includes copies to all AFMS past Presidents, current officers, all AFMS and Regional Chairpersons and three copies to each club in each in all Regional Federations, that the AFMS Central Office has addresses for. "Here comes Peter Cottontail, hoppin' down the bunny trail, hippity hoppin', Easter's on its way. Bringin' every girl and boy baskets full of Easter joy, things to make your Easter bright and gay.

If ever a song rang more true for someone, this one almost seems to have been written for Alexandra Feodorovna, The Tsarina of the Imperial Russian Court. However, her Easter bunny went by the name of Carl Faberge.

Carl Faberge created the famous Imperial Easter eggs for the Russian Tsars to give to the Tsarina on Easter morning. In Russia, Easter, the most important holy festival of the entire calendar year, was marked by the traditional exchange of eggs, a symbol of Resurrection and three kisses.

Carl Faberge was a goldsmith, who in 1870, as a young man of 24, took over the conventional jeweiry business founded by his father, Gustav. While working for the court of the Imperial Russia under Alexander III and Nicholas II from 1895 to 1917, Faberge and his craftsmen devoted all their skill and ingenuity to the extra ordinary Easter eggs, each of which embodied a theme or hid a surprise of some sort, sometimes of a mechanical nature. They were designed solely to give the Tsarina hours of pleasure.

The first Imperial egg made, believed to be in 1884, has a height of 2 1/2 inches. The shell of the egg is gold, enameled opaque white, and polished to give the effect of a hen's egg. The two halves are held together by a bayonet fitting. When these are opened, a yellow gold yolk with a dull sandblasted surface is revealed. Inside this yolk, which opens in the same way as the shell, sits a yellow and white tinted gold hen as though in a nest. Each feather is carefully engraved with two cabochon ruby eyes set in the head, the beak and the comb are in red gold. By lifting the head, the hen opens on a hinge at the tail. Originally, a diamond replica of the Imperial Crown was contained inside the hen, and when this was opened, a tiny ruby pendant was found hanging inside.

It is believed that there were 57 Imperial Eggs made for Alexander III and Nicholas II.

While Faberge may best be known for his Russian Imperial Easter Eggs, his mastery with agate, chalcedony, and quartz resulted in dazzling carvings of animals, flower boxes, jewels, picture frames, automated pieces, perfume bottles, icons, small decorative objects, even one or two pieces of furniture.

The exquisite objects that came out of the Faberge workshop represent the ultimate refinement of his art, and can be enjoyed in one's leisure with the many books on this "Rabbit of Distinction." THE ART OF CARL FABERGE by A. Kenneth Snowman and FABERGE: COURT JEWELLER TO THE TSARS by Dr. Geza Von Habsburg and Alexander Solodkoff are just two such books for you to gaze upon while you eat your chocolate Easter bunny.
