




Mineral Terminology: Word of the Month: Chatoyancy

The light effect which resembles the sliteye of a cat. This is caused by the reflection of light from parallel fibers, needles and cavities in a stone. Most effective when the cut is *en cabochon*. The most common stones this is associated with are Tiger's eye and moonstone and in the manmade material fiber-optic glass.

Closely related to chatoyancy is what is called "Asterism". This is Star-Shaped rays of light which meet at a point. It is formed like a cat's eye, except that the reflecting fibers lie in different directions. Found in some sapphires and garnets and in synthetic sapphires and rubies.

## The "February Birth Stone": Amethyst

#### AMETHYST

The much prized amethyst is a varlety of quartz of various shades of purple or violet. One of the qualities that enhance the beauty and desirability of a gem stone is the possibility of seeing into its depths. The amethyst has this physical property. As amethyst of gem quality should be perfectly transparent, deep purple in color, and cut "brilliant", as the jewelers say.

This six-sided variety of quartz has pointed crystals. The color variation is believed to be due to impurities such as iron and manganese. There is also a purple variety of the mineral coundum that is called the Original Amethyst.

At one time the amethyst was nearly as valuable as the diamond. New, extensive deposits in many parts of the world, especially Siberia, Brazil, Mexico, and Nova Scotia, have caused this gem to be less than one-tenth its former value. Amethysts are found in many places in the United States and some fine crystals have been collected in Chester and Delware counties of Pennsylvania.
