RAMBLINGS FROM OTHER ROCKHOUNDS

THE T-TOWN ROCKHOUND: Petoskey stones -- interesting and unique type of fossil coral-mainly calcite- somewhat difficult to polish. It is well known that calcite, being soft may not give a high glossy finish like agate. For an attractive finish try grinding, course sanding, then etch for 15 to 20 minutes in hydrochloric solution to which has been added a small amount of oxalic acid. The solution should be 30%. After washing and drying there is usually no need to polish. (Rocky imes, Rockette, The Lapidary)

THE GEO-LOGIC: Southern Minnesota good area for fossils -- Fossils from the reefs of a primordal tropical sea are easily accessible from many highways in southwestern Minnesota/ One good place to find fossils, according to the state highway department, is in the bed of a stream crossed by Highway 56, just south of its junction with 246 North of Kenyon. Other excellent collecting sites on Hwy 56 are the Decorah shale outcropings immediately north of the highways junction with Hwy 246. Fossil hunters may also have luck on the bluffs along Hwy 60 near and east of Dumfries. Further south on Hwy 14, rock hounds will find that the quarries between Rochester and Kasson contain fossils. 




THE RAMBERG FAMILY

ABOUT THE NEW COVER OF THE NEWSLETTER

When the subject of a theme for the RMFMS 1975 show was first brought up, suggestions flew fast and furious. It was the bicentennial year, then there is the energy situation, the turquois boom, the Trinity site, the potash and copper mines, even Pecos diamonds; all suggesting themes. Yet all of these things are current events when one considers man's utilization of minerals in what is now the state of New Mexico.

Humans have lived in this eres a long time. What little we know of the encient residents is information gleened from the mineral artifacts of their culture. Sendia man, approximately 25,000 years 8C, used quartz minerals to make tools and weapons. Clovie man circa 10,000 BC, Folson man circa 7000 BC and the Plano culture circa 4000 BC did the same. The archiac Indian and modern Indian culture used mineral for adornment, tools, weapons and as trade goods. We in modern times are no different when one thinks of copper, coal, uranium, petroleum and potash; not to mention Rockhounds. So--we chose as our theme, "Our Mineral Legacy" with a little subtitle of "Man's Utilization of Minerals".

Wayne Whiting, a member of the host club was asked to design a cover for the RMFMS Neweletter depicting the thame. He chose Clovis man in the upper right to represent the ancient cultures; the Navajo at lower right to represent all indian delibers; the Spanish Conquistador at lower right to represent the Spanish and Mexican cultures; and last, the uranium prospector at upper laft representing our present culture - over 25,000 years of man's mineral utilization depicted on one page.

Using that long a period of time as a theme is going to be quite a challange. However, the host club, The Chaperral Rockhounds, expects to do a creditable job. Come visit the RMFMS show in Roswell, NM June 25427, 1976 and judge for yourself. Let us know you are coming and what your mineral interests are. New Mexico still has a few mineral specimens lying around and I understand there is till a little cutting material to be found. We will try to direct you to a place where you just might acquire a souvenir of your of your visit with us.
