EIGHT COMMON ROCK-FORMING MINERALS

The following is a summary of the talk made by Duane Robey at the last meeting about the most important rock-forming minerals.

Abundance of the Eight Most Important Chemical Elements in the Earth's Crust in Weight Percent

Oxygen	46.6	Calcium	3,63
Silicon	27.72	Sodium	2.83
Aluminum	8.13	Potassium	2.59
Iron	5.00	Magnewium	2.09

Although there are more than ninety elements found in nature, the above eight constitute nearly ninety-nine percent of the total amount found in the earth's crust.

The dominant element is oxygen, not as a gas as in the air that we breathe, but as charged atoms bound to metal atoms by powerful electrical forces. Of the metal atoms, silicon is the most important, for the rock-making minerals are silicates—that is, compounds containing oxygen—silicon groups. The common mineral quartz is composed of only these two elements.

Although the list of rock-making minerals is long, only a few make up the bulk of most rocks. There are many interesting varieties of the common minerals that could be considered; only those important to the understanding of rocks are listed below.

martz, perhaps the best known mineral, is found in a number of varieties and forms. We most often think of it as a colorless crystal; however, it appears as rose quartz, smoky quartz, milky quartz, amethyst, citrine, and others. In the cryptocrystallineform (submicroscopic particles), it may be found as fibrous or granular. Chalcedony is the general name applied to the fibrous varieties, which include carnelian, sard, chrysoprase, agate, bloodstone, onyx, and others. The common granular varieties are flint, chert, jasper, and prase.

Quartz combines with five of the other major rock-forming minerals to form the very abundant rock of this area,

granite. All five are rather complex aluminum silicates. Muscovite, biotite, and hornblende by themselves are not very attractive. However, the feldspars, orthoclase and plagioclase, appear in beautiful gem quality specimens. Two familiar ones are sunstone (orthoclase) and labrodorite (plagioclase).

The six minerals mentioned above unite in various combinations to form other granite-related rocks, such as the granodiorites, diorites, syenites, and trachytes.

Olivine and augite, both iron- and magnesium-rich silicates, combine with the plagioclase feldspars and hornblendes to form dark rocks called gabbro and basalt. Their darkness is due in part to a lack of quartz and the presence of the dark-green-to-black augite and the olive-to-grayish-green olivine. Other accessory minerals are usually also present.
