AT THE LAST MEETING -- Jan. 4

Thirty-seven adults and four juniors were reported present at the last meeting by Rod Hickle, acting Greeter.

The meeting was called to order by the outgoing president, Harold Brady. After disposition of old business, new officers were installed.

Upon assuming office, Mary Beth Osborn, 1981 president, thanked the members for electing her to that position. She then read Article II of the Constitution of the Society to review the purposes of the Society.

Bob Randall, show treasurer, gave a final report on the 1980 show and related that present show assets are \$1,792.17. In the absence of the Show Chairman, Bob also reported that all of the dealers have been selected for the 1981 show and that several have already returned their contracts with deposits.

A motion was passed that the Society purchase an amplifying system from funds in the Society's C.D. and that a committee be appointed for this purpose. President Osborn appointed the following committee to price amplifying systems and to recommend one for purchase: Harold Brady, chr.; Bill Buresh; and George Robinson.

A motion was passed that the Society formally approve sponsoring a show in 1981, with a change in the name of the show for 1982.

A motion was passed that a committee of five be appointed to formulate a written policy to guide show committees, and that the committee report within sixty days. President appointed the following committee for this purpose: Don Campbell, chairman; Earle Campbell; Bill Buresh; Walter Buck; and Ray Jensen.

Emma Brady, outgoing historian, requested that a note be included in the "Diggin's" stating that the first book of the historian's records for the club from 1966-1971 has been missing from the history files since she received them, asking if anyone knows of their whereabouts.

It would be greatly appreciated if anyone would report any information about this matter to Emma Brady or to the new historian, Glenn Michaels, so that the complete books of the club's history may be kept on file or in the club library.

Earle Campbell, Program Chairman, handed out suggestion forms for club programs for the rest of the year and asked that members complete the forms and return them at the next meeting. A copy of this form is also attached to the "Diggin's."

DUES ARE PAST DUE

President Mary Beth Osborn has requested that a notice about dues be included in this issue of the "Diggin's", with a clarification of the date that dues are due.

Under "ARTICLE IV. DUES" the Constitution of the Society states: "Annual dues shall be as follows, payable at the beginning of each calendar year:

- Family Membership \$8.00 per year, which includes children below age twenty-one.
- 2. Individual Adult Membership \$6.00 per year.
- Individual Junior Membership -\$3.00 per year."

Although it has been customary to allow a "grace period" on the "Diggin's" and to continue to send — the bulletin for a short time after January 1, for the benefit of members who might be away from home at the first of the year, according to the constitution membership ceases on January 1 for all those whose dues are not yet paid.

DID YOU KNOW---that club member Duane Robey, a science teacher at Simle Junior High School in Bismarck, has been teaching a lapidary arts class on his own time for several years? The class meets after school hours from Monday through Thursday. Ten different students are presently participating, with from five to seven present daily.

Equipment for the class includes a double six-pound tumbler, a ten-inch slabbing saw, a six-inch trim saw, and three eight-inch double-end grinder/polishers.

Duane reports that some of the young students become quite proficient by the end of the session and produce some very interesting and creative products.

METEORITE CONTAINING 2 TYPES OF IGNEOUS ROCKS DISCOVERED

Another unique meteorite has been found in the Johnson Space Center collection of rocks from space, Donald D. Bogart said, "This is the first time we know of in a meteorite, and probably any extraterrestrial rock, where two different types of igneous rocks have been found in contact." Bogart is assistant curator of the Antarctic meteorite collection.

"It may be the first undisturbed contact between two igneous rocks in any extraterrestrial rock," said Arch Reid, a visiting geologist from the University of Capetown, South Africa.

Igneous rocks are formed from magmas, molten mixtures of minerals. They are found in abundance in volcanic areas. It is common to find rocks on Earth with different types of igneous rocks.

The scientists recently began a preliminary examination of the 17-pound meteorite which they sawed in half. They also took a thin slice from one half, pieces of which will be distributed to scientists for analysis. Even a layman's eye can distinguish the two igneous rocks on the face of the sliced meteorite.

The largest part of it is fine-grained, while a smaller part is of coarser grain. Two of the more interesting features of the meteorite are globules of black glass and a blackened cavity on one side about an inch wide and 1 1/2-inches deep.

Somewhere, perhaps on a large asteroid called Vesta, billions of years ago, Bogart said it is possible that grains in a pool of magma settled to the bottom and crystallized. At some later time, there was another layer of crystalization that eventually became the second igneous rock.

Something, perhaps two asteroids collidin tore the meteorite from its parent body (most probably an asteroid). Eventually, its orbital path sent it through the earth's thick atmosphere (giving it a black, fusion crust) to the Allan Hills region in Antarctica. The glass globules were probably formed when the meteorite was wrenched from its parent body or during another collision when material was forced into the interior of the meteorite. The meteorite is classed as a shergottite, rarest of the meteorite classes. There are probably only four to six of this class known in the world. -from AFMS Newsletter, January 1981.


