MEETING NOTES

Present at the July meeting were thirty-three members, two juniors, and one guest, Cindy Gordon, of Bismarck, ND.

Hostesses for the meeting were Helen Helson and Blossomae Campbell. No hostesses were appointed for the August meeting, inasmuch as a potluck dinner is planned.

The annual picnic and field trip to the Glen Ullin-Almont areas which were previously scheduled for August 1 have been cancelled. Other plans for August 1 are reported under "Field Trips."

The next meeting is scheduled for Sunday, August 22, at the regular meeting room in the Capital Electric Building. A potluck supper is scheduled for 5:30 p.m., followed by a business meeting at 7:30 p.m. For the supper, each family should bring for their own members sandwiches and any beverage desired other than coffee, plus one additional dish for the potluck. The dish may be a hot dish, salad, or dessert. Each family should also provide their own plates, cups, and eating utensils. Coffee will be served.

Don Larson was elected treasurer for the balance of the year to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dick Bergentine, who has moved out of the area and is no longer able to attend meetings regularly.

Earle Campbell, show chairman, announced that a certificate of appreciation will be presented to the owner of each display, and he urged all members, including junior members, to prepare some type of display or exhibit for the September show. He also stated that "Swap Bucks" will be sold by the cashier during the show. These may be used at the "Swapping Table" by those not having any trading materials. Demonstrations in faceting and in jade polishing and cabochon making will be added attractions during the show.

Bob Randall, publicity chairman for the show, announced that TV Talk Shows about the September show are scheduled for local stations on September 7 and 8. plus radio spots and a banner strip ad in the <u>Tribune</u>. Three hundred seventy-five publicity packets have been mailed.

Subscription chairman Larry Strand reported that the subscription rates for the Lapidary Journal have increased to \$8.95 per year. The Society will receive \$2.25 from each subscription purchased through its chairman.

The following Society members were reported on the sick list: Ewald Muggli is hospitalized in Rochester; Ted Giese was hospitalized since the last meeting and is now resting at home; Emil Hilkin is improving at home but is still not able to get out to meetings.

The program for the evening was a slide and talk presentation by the Campbells on "How to Prepare an Attractive Showcase Display." Blossomae discussed displays and demonstrated the arranging of specimens in a showcase, and Earle showed slides of some very attractive displays as well as some with less desirable features. A summary of their suggestions is listed on the following page.

TIPS ON A SHOWCASE DISPLAY

Here are a few tips I gleaned from the AFMS Exhibitors Manual. Some of them might be useful in helping you with your displays.

Adequate ventilation should be used if lights are used in a show case. Many gems and minerals crack or deteriorate under prolonged heat.

Make sure overhead or back lights are so placed that no shadows fall on exhibited specimens.

If you use tube lights they should be the daylight type. Fluorescent type lights may distort the color of many specimens.

If you paint the ceiling of your case white you will get better light disbursement.

In lining your case, chose a color that will compliment your specimens. You may want to select a neutral color such as light beige, white or pastel shades that will blend with all specimens or you may want to select a color which will be a contrast to your specimens. If strong colors are used be sure they do not overpower the specimens shown.

A material with a very pronounced texture may draw attention away from the specimens on exhibit. Outing flannel, indianhead, velvet, orlon fleece, straw-cloth, and many of the new drapery fabrics have good texture.

A shiny surface such as satin reflects light and can distract the viewer. A stretch type of display cloth is good because it fits over the corners of risers without wrinkles.

When placing specimens do not put them too close together that they detract from one another, nor so far apart that there are wide open spaces in between. A good rule of thumb is to leave as much space around the specimens as the specimen takes up.

Place the specimens in the position to show each specimen to the best advantage.

In general we say keep the larger specimens in the back.

If you have one outstanding piece it should be used for the center of interest.

Do not put all large specimens on one side of the case.

Separate vividly colored specimens to make the case look balanced.

Dark specimens give the feeling of weight so all the dark specimens should not be on one side.

If you use labels, be sure that they are neatly placed, and do not zig zag around the specimen. It is best to place all labels at one angle so a viewer can easily read all labels from one position.

Have all labels laying flat in the case or have them all standing. Do not mix them.

Although the above tips are to be used where exhibits will be judged, I think they are also useful to our type of show. Anything that makes a case look attractive is a big help.

MILES CITY GEM AND MINERAL SHOW

On Friday, June 18, Sue and I left Bismarck in late afternoon to attend the Yellowstone Agate Club Gem and Mineral Show held in Miles City, Montana. We drove into western North Dakota that evening and stayed at the Buffalo Gap Campground west of Medora. This was a very nice camping area and was lightly used - there being only three other parties in the campground that night. An attractive scenic view point with two educational displays has been developed adjacent to the campground by the Forest Service. One of these points out and names the highest points of land in the vicinity and tells a bit about the geology of the area. The other explains the formation of "scoria".

After a good nights sleep and a leisurely breakfast we were on our way again. It was a beautiful morning and we stopped for awhile at a creek several miles west of Glendive, and again at Cherry Creek northeast of Terry, Mont. where we looked for rock. I found two fairly nice small agates and several pieces of colorful jasper.

We arrived at Miles City shortly after the doors to the show opened. Before getting a good start at making the rounds of the dealers and exhibits we met Emma and Pius Fischer and then Blossomae and Earle Campbell.

There were 9 or 10 dealers present who had a very good variety of material. Don Faust of Rock and Gem Jewelry, from Adrian, Mich. had an exceptionally good stock of books on rocks, minerals, fossils and all aspects of the hobby. He also had an unusually large stock of Lapidary tools and supplies. Howard C. Ehrle from Miles City was a dealer who was particularly interesting to me since he specialized in minerals. He had an excellent assortment of good quality specimens from many areas. After spending a considerable amount of time at this booth I acquired a couple of nice additions to my collection. Mr. Ehrle also had some very large white sharks teeth - both individually and in a ground mass matrix from California.

Three of the dealers at the show had been at our show in Mandan last year. These were Canyon Road Rock Shop, Rolene Rock Shop and J - B Silversmiths.

Although the number of exhibits was limited there were some very nice displays. The most outstanding to me was the Montana Agate in hand wrought silver and gold by Mr. Klapmeir of Miles City. Everyone should see this beautiful work. A display of fluorescent material was shown in a separate darkened room. Some nice specimens were to be seen and they were shown and discussed by one of the hosts at the show.

We came home by way of Baker, Mont. and Bowman, N.D. and on Sunday we stopped several times to look for petrified wood. It was an enjoyable trip and we saw a number of new and interesting things at the show. - Bob Randall

Members wishing to attend should meet at 10:00 s.m. (Bismarck time) at the Breien turnoff on Highway #6 south of Mandan. (The Breien turnoff is just north of the Cannonball River bridge, which is about 28 miles south of Mandan.)
