# FIELD TRIP - July 30

Field Trip Co-Chairman Larry Strand has announced that another field trip has been scheduled for Sunday, July 30, along the Cannonball River about thirty miles south of Mandan. Arrangements have been made with the owner of the property for club members to hunt specimens on this date.

Participants will assemble by 10:00 a.m. (CDST) at the picnic area just north of the Heart River bridge and west of Highway #6 in South Mandan. From there the group will travel in a caravan to the collecting area. Members coming from the south can join the caravan at a gate approximately two miles north of the Campaball River on Highway #6. Anything from fossils to agates can be found in this area (mostly tumbling size material).

It may be a hot day, so come equipped with appropriate clothes, food, and water.

It will be greatly appreciated if each member will request space for at least one exhibit. This will provide an opportunity for every member to become directly involved with the show and at the same time provide a nice variety of exhibits for viewers, showing the wide range of things that our members to with rocks.

Members who plan to have more than one exhibit should request an additional form for each case.

Exhibiting should be viewed as a responsibility by each member because by so doing he or she is adding to the success of our shows—not only the 1978 show but also every show thereafter. People will be coming back year after year if there are sufficient exhibits.

At the last meeting Bob Randall showed some slides of outstanding displays from national or regional shows. He indicated that not all of us are expected to have award-winning exhibits and certainly not at the first showing. Everyone has to start some time and hopefully improve from year to year, and eventually our own members may be able to have exhibits like those pictured.

An exhibit should tell a story, it should be neat, it should be unclowded, and it should be made as attractive as possible but not necessarily elaporate. An exhibit may be made attractive by simply arranging the specimens in some orderly fashion.

I have repeated here some of what Bob said at the meeting, but purposely so for emphasis and for the benefit of members not at the meeting.

The Juniors are not being ignored. They should be commended for the quality and number of exhibits they displayed at the last two shows. It would be nice to also see more juniors involved so that the number of exhibits in this category would also increase.

Any members exhibiting for the first time who desire help or suggestions in planning an exhibit, please contact me or any of the other experienced exhibitors in the club.

An early reply is needed from members so that plans can be made in advance for the appropriate amount of exhibit space needed at show time. (Don't wait until your exhibit is complete to request space. Just list the size of your show case on the exhibitor's application form, and complete the exhibit by show time.)

Again I ask for your cooperation in preparing an exhibit and in returning forms early.

# RHODOCHROSITE (Rose of the Inca)

Rhodochrosite is one of the calcite group of carbonate minerals consisting of manganese carbonate. It has a beautiful rose colour. The name comes from the Greek 'rhodo' meaning rose, and 'chros' meaning colour. It is sometimes known as manganese spar. The stone was known by the soldiers of Inca Ripac, also called Viracocha, when he conquered the northeastern part of Argentina for the Tahuantisuyo or Inca's Empire, back in the 13th Century. In excavations in the north of Argentina mummies of the Incas were found with amulets made of this pink stone, which explains why it is called the Rose of the Inca or Rosinca.

Rhodochrosite was formed millions of years ago when the manganese crystallised in the rhombohedral system. The stone occurs commonly as compact crystalline masses and incrustations rather than as single crystals. Extensive substitution of iron and calcium, as well as lesser amounts of magnesium, may occur in place of the manganese.

One of the mines which produces the best quality of rhodochrosite is located in the province of Catamarca, in a place called Capillita. Because of the high consistency of manganese in the stones it is exploited by the military manufacturers, whose personnel select the more valuable pieces to have the artists of the world make them into jewels and ornamental objects.

## SHOP HINTS

The "NO WASH" Method of Tumble Polishing: Start with no. 80 grit. Tumble a week. Don't empty tumbler, but add 5 teaspoons full of new grit to the mixture in a 3-lb. tumbler. Follow this procedure through with nos. 190, 320, and 600 grit. Thoroughly wash the stones and tumbler before polish and final powders. For a glossy finish, after washing out add three spoons of sugar, one level spoon of Cascade or All or any non-sudsing detergent, and about ten drops of muriatic acid if you have some. Let stand open one minute, close tub, and tumble for a week.
