

AT THE LAST MEETING

Genevieve Buresh reported on behalf of the Mame Badge Committee. The Committee was instructed to order 150 name badges. They will be available to members at \$1.00 each. A model of the design is shown elsewhere in this issue.

Sharon Springer, Chairman, reported on behalf of the Vest Committee. Discussion followed on measurements, etc. The Committee was justified to order material

An amendment requires a two-thirds vote of members present (Article XI. Amendments).

An exhibit case was on display for inspection by those that might be interested in constructing a case or in having one constructed. Construction plans and specifications for the case were also available. Members not at this meeting may obtain plans and specifications from Exhibit Chairman, Bill Buresh.

An abundance of material and a nice variety was on hard for the silent auction which followed the business meeting.

The Lunch Committee consisted of Sharon Springer, Ida Mae Ramberg, and Alice Springer.

THE TUCSON GEN AND NIMERAL SHOW--by Bob and Sue Randall

The Tucson Gem and Mineral Show is considered by many to be the finest show of its kind in the world. So it was with a great deal of anticipation that we boarded the plane on the evening of February 9, en route to Tucson, Arizona, and a few days away from the snow and cold. The show proved to be everything we had anticipated and more. The show itself was not as large as the Ogden Show last summer. There were not as many exhibits nor as many dealers at the show proper, but when all the dealers and material to be seen in the various hotels and motels were added to the show, it was much more than could be covered in three days. The heavy emphasis were on minerals and gems and not on the lapidary art, although there was some excellent lapidary work shown. For those of us with a particular interest in mineralogy it was an exciting event.

Headmont Azurite" from the American Museum of Natural History, New York, reportedly valued at a quarter of a million dollars; the Smithsonian Museum exhibit of "Dinerals of Brazil"; the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Science with "The Best of the Academy"; "Minerals of Canada" by the National Museum of Canada; "Pyrite and Its Many Forms", a very good educational display by the Royal Ontario Museum; "Minerals" from the University of Paris; "Minerals" from Idar-Oberstein, West Germany; and "Minerals from the Sonoran Desert" by the Arizona-Sonora Desert Museum. Other special exhibitors included the Los Angeles County Museum, San Diego County Museum, Denver Museum of Matural History, Harvard University, and others. One exhibit of a single spectacular specimen was "The Aztec Sun", a Legrandite specimen from Mexico which was the subject of an article in Rock and Gem magazine, March 1978.

There were 31 retail dealers listed for the show. These included dealers from Portugal, Canada, Mexico, Switzerland, Africa, and England, as well as many of the best known mineral dealers in this country. There were also 16 wholesale dealers listed on the program. With dealers from such a broad area there was a great variety of material and many high quality specimens.

In addition to all of the dealers and material available at the show, there was a great deal of activity in many hotels and motels in the area. At the Marriott Hotel, which is next to the Community Conter where the show was held, one large room on the main floor, most rooms on the lower level, and most rooms on the mezzanine level were occupied by dealers. We visited rooms with minerals and gems on display tables, on dressers, on beds, and on the floor. Again dealers were from all parts of this country and we found others from West Germany, Southwest Africa, Japan, Brazil, Mexico, and Peru. Activities were also great at the Desert Inn, several blocks down the street, where room after room had specimens on display. After three days which we spent at the show, there were at least three more motels which had gem and mineral dealers that we did not have time to visit.

One day we saw fellow club member Wilma Hilgemann from Leola, SD and on another we met and visited with Mr. and Mrs. Jim Howell of the Rocky Mountain Federation. The Rowells were wearing their North Dakota buttons which Earle Campbell had given them at the Ogden show last summer.

There were several interesting lectures given during the course of the show. One on "Tyxite" by Dr. Robert Gait, Assoc. Curator of Mineralogy, Royal Ontario Museum, was of particular interest to us as it dealt with crystal forms and their modifications. Another lecture we attended was "Pogmatites of Afghanistan" by Dr. Pierre Bariaud, from the University of Paris.

On Saturday evening awards were presented for some of the best exhibits and individual specimens, and the large audience participated in selection of winners in the Mineralogical Record slide competition. Twenty excellent color slides of (cont.)


minerals were judged. Later on Saturday evening there was an auction of a large number of specimens and other items for the benefit of The Mineralogical Record.

One room at the Community Center was active during most of the Show with "swappers" and we noted that "swapper dollars" were used similar to the system we use at our show.

Next year's Tucson Gem and Mineral Show will be their 25th Anniversary and it will be held on February 9, 10, and 11, 1979. If mineralogy is your "thing", this is the show to see.

ANG PARTANTAN PARTANT

Members present at the April 2 meeting will ballot on a proposed change in the Constitution of the Society in Article VIII, Section 2, which presently reads: "Sales, trades, or silent auctions of gem materials shall be transacted only after the formal meeting. No such activities shall take place during a business session. Ten percent of the proceeds of all sales of any items on the premises and on the date of a meeting of the Society shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Society."

The proposed amendment would change the amount of the percentage of sales at # Society meetings from ten percent to twenty percent. The third sentence of # Article Viii, Section 2, would then read: "Twenty percent of the proceeds of all # sales of any items on the premises and on the date of a meeting of the Society # shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Society."

Article XI of the Constitution provides that a two-thirds vote of members present # at the next regular meeting following introduction of a proposed amendment is # required for approval of any amendment to the Constitution of the Society.

SHOP HINT

Stones sometimes develop fine, thread-like scratches while being polished. These may be due to grit that has penetrated the polishing buff (one grain will do it). To clean, hold a strip of soft plywood or balsa wood firmly against the buff. The grit will embed itself in the wood, leaving the cloth buff clean.
