BUDGET COMMITTEE REPORT

Duane Robey, Larry Strand and Donal Campbell met in committee and reviewed the financial condition of the Central Dakota Gem & Mineral Society.

Report:

In the last three years membership dropped by 20%. In the last three years silent auction proceeds dropped 50%.

The club was founded in 1966 and dues were established at \$5.00. There has been no increase in 14 years, but cost of living, postage, paper, etc. have more than doubled.

- *Motion made that effective immediately we double the Society dues from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

- *Motion that the president appoint a three party budget committee one member to be the Society treasurer to formulate a yearly budget for all future expenditures.

Every article I've read this year tells me the attendance at rock shows are way down. I have talked to all our show dealers within the past few days, and they make the same report. A drastic drop in sales and attendance at the shows.

This year, more than ever before, we need to make a concentrated effort to get people to come to our show. Not just so the dealers will make money - we need the sales from tickets and proceeds from the silent auction to keep the show from going broke. Over the past few years our membership in the club has been consistently decreasing, so we need to arouse the people to come to the show and hopefully stir up enough interest in a few of them so they will eventually join the club.

Let's be honest - how many people actually know what a Rock Club is? or what is a Gem & Mineral Show? or what is lapidary?

How many people do you know that could tell you of the varied interests embodied in a rock show - biology, geology, anthropology, gemology - from artifacts through gold smithing - it's a facetnating hobby.

For the past couple of years I've been spreading the word about when and where the show will be held, and every year there are numerous people who later will tell me they forgot and wish I had called them to remind them about the show. In fact, a couple of them were a bit put out because I had not made that extra little effort to call and remind them.

- *There will be nine dealers from six different states to supply your needs and show what is new in the hobby. This is an ideal time to get that special something for someone's Christmas or birthday or anniversary present. Our dealers always have that "special unique something" you have been looking for. Handcrafted and cast jewelry, carvings, jade, opal, fine agate and, this year a large variety of mineral specimens.
- *They can get involved in the silent auction or
- *They can pick up some choice specimens at the swap table or
- *Bring in that prize rock laying around the house and have someone identify it, or
- *See one or all five of the slide programs available this year:
 - a. Jewels and Gems of North Dakota
 - b. The Earth is Born Past events on the planet
 - c. Junk to Jewelry Equipment and finished jewelry
 - d. Lets Look at Rock Elementary program on Geology
 - e. Structure of Minerals as a Clue to Their Identity Educational

Where else can you spend an entire day and/or evening and be completely entertained for one dollar?

So save this list and start calling your friends - don't let them miss this great show! Remind them that this is a very casual affair - it should be seen and savored thoroughly. There are plenty of chairs scattered throughout the show for those tired feet.

Layered Lettuce Salad (Printed by request)

1 head lettuce

l cup celery diced

4 hard cooked eggs

l pkg. frozen peas

1/2 cup green pepper, diced

4 slices bacon(fried crisp and crumbled)

2 cups mayonnaise

2 Tbsp. sugar

1 Tosp lemon juice

4 oz. cheddar cheese (grated)

Layer vegetable ingredients in a 9 x 13 inch cake pan (preferably glass, as this keeps well for several days). Place them in the pan in the order given. Mix mayonnaise, sugar and lemon juice. Spread over top of vegetables as a frosting. Sprinkle cheese and bacon bits over dressing. Refrigerate for 8-12 hours (or overnight) before serving.

STAMP PROGRAM
